INTRODUCTION

This new body of work by Jasleen Kaur for Humber Street Gallery began with the encounter of a text written by a member of the artist's family. A charmed item that acts as an instructional guide to healing the body, and a point of speculation to missing kin.

The artist explores our relationship to the body. What is latent and carried intergenerationally, and the visceral emotions of grief and ecstatic healing that are inherited and repeated. "If trauma can leave a chemical mark on a person's genes, then so can radical healing, right?" she writes. Biological and chosen kin are invoked through collaborative making and rituals.

In this series of mainly sculptural works, play and making are tools to invoke, remedy and create new language so that we can understand the body and its stored emotions. Kaur remixes traditional practices and objects that enable healing. Works are ingested, transformed by the gut, carried beyond the gallery walls and excreted. The exhibition invites you to engage with organs and senses, and to take part in this shared bodily experience.

The centrepiece of the exhibition sees a new textile artwork, taking the form of a 4 metre long custom made, double ended, kameez, a traditional dress commonly worn across central and south Asia. The fabric is stained and marked with the spice turmeric, known for its anti-inflammatory properties, and a series of symbols and text are embroidered onto the surface. The imagery that spreads across the dress tells a story of overlapping, generational identities. The Kirpan, a sacred ceremonial Sikh dagger used to bless food, now resembles a Nike 'just do it' tick. A long plait of uncut hair straddles the words 'MART-HER' signifying legacies of Sikh martyrdom and ongoing sacrifices of women. A colon excretes the words 'colonial indigestion' pointing to historical hangovers and the gut as a storer of trauma. Idioms such as "cry your heart out", "getting some—thing off one's chest" and the title of the exhibition itself, "flesh and blood" mirrors how Kaur finds metaphors through materials and objects to describe the relationship between our physical bodies and our emotions.

Internals of the body extend further to the low platform, resembling a colon, that meanders through the gallery and plays host to a number of smaller sculptures. This acts as a subtle reference to the idiom of "having a gut feeling", something that suggests the overriding power of intuition over a more considered and rational approach to making a decision. Memories of objects that frequented homes and spaces of worship — acupressure flip flops, irn bru, ceremonial instruments — make appearances but have evolved, departing from tradition moving towards future rituals and practices. You can even eat revered scripture held in a prayer stand, suggesting the body is a sacred, magical entity. The show is accented by a series of new works by Priya Jay including "Bless this flesh"; a prayer held in parshad (blessed food) bags that also stem from traditional devotional practices but moves beyond them and brings your attention to your body.

Spread across two large walls of the gallery are enlarged images sourced from the artist's family photo albums. Blown up to a scale which dominates the space, the presence of the women depicted is felt. Dressed immaculately and gathered in congregation, they suggest something ceremonial and intimate is taking place that they are there to witness. This intimacy is mirrored in the works in the show, often made collaboratively with chosen kin and with materials and processes from homeplaces.

Some of the works in the exhibition are intended to be touched, eaten or drank. These are identified by an * on the floorplan. If you are unsure, please speak to a member of the gallery team.


