CLIMATE FEEDBACK LOOPS

OLIVER RESSLER 18 January - 2 April

INTRODUCTION

Oliver Ressler is an artist and filmmaker based in Vienna who produces works on issues such as economics, democracy, migration, climate breakdown, forms of resistance and social alternatives. *Climate Feedback Loops* is a 2-channel video installation combining recordings the artist took during an expedition in July 2022 in Svalbard, an archipelago between the Northern coast of Norway and the North Pole.

Temperatures in the Arctic are rising 5-7 times faster than the global average. Svalbard has become a hotspot and is one of the fastest overheating places on the entire planet. The Arctic Sea ice is disappearing at a rate of roughly 13% per decade. This destroys the fragile relations of mutual dependence that make life on this planet possible. The sounds of Arctic collapse in the installation serve as an acoustic counterpart to the collapse of the texture of life, which has already begun.

Climate Feedback Loops is complemented by the film *Carbon and Captivity* (2020).The film is structured into four chapters, each of which introduces a different perspective through its narration and interweaves shots of the technology centre and oil refinery Mongstad in Norway with poetic-political text and dense sound design.

For decades, nation states and politicians have proven unable to decarbonize the economy. Oil corporations have funded climate change denial for a quarter century while their own scientists plied them with proofs of disaster. At a moment when most people feel the effects of climate change in their own lives, oil corporations have changed their strategies and are now pushing for the generalized use of technological procedures that would allow them to continue extracting oil whilst claiming to be sustainable.

Also included in the exhibition is Ressler's 2021 film *Not Sinking, Swarming.* This film originated in a four-hour assembly in Madrid in October 2019, where delegates from various environmental groups gathered to prepare an act of civil disobedience. The groups – Ecologistas en Acción, Alternativa Antimilitarista MOC, Legal Sol, Extinction Rebellion, Climacció, Fridays for Future and Greenpeace – are part of the platform By 2020 We Rise up, which is active throughout Europe and seeks to foster climate rebellion. This film is one of a very small number of existing documents that offer a real insight into the processes of climate movements' self-organization.

ABOUT THE ARTIST


Oliver Ressler (born 1970 in Knittelfeld Austria) is an artist and filmmaker who produces installations, projects in public space, and films on issues such as economics, democracy, migration, the climate crisis, forms of resistance and social alternatives.

Oliver Ressler has had solo exhibitions at various galleries and museums across the globe and has participated in more than 400 group exhibitions.

He has also completed 38 films that have been screened in thousands of events of social movements, art institutions and film festivals. In 2002, he won the first prize at the International Media Art Award of the ZKM in Karlsruhe and he is the first prize winner of the Prix Thun for Art and Ethics Award in 2016.

Since 2019 Ressler directed Barricading the Ice Sheets, a research project on the climate justice movement, funded by the Austrian Science Fund.
