EXHIBITION TEXT

Let's meet up with North Sea; sit together, breathe together, and reflect on our relationship: the love and affection we share, the anger and frustrations we face.

Artist Solmaz Farhang invites the audience to an unconventional encounter with the North Sea, to explore our coexistence with this body of water which the artist personifies as a living entity.

The North Sea is home to an incredible diversity of species and organisms, with its coasts sustaining countless human communities. The coastline is in constant flux, a shifting landscape that impacts our lives profoundly. Where the North Sea ends and the land begins is a question with no clear answer. It is a frontier and a crossroads, a service station for travelers and thoroughfare for expansion and migration. A sea with a fraught history of war, trade and industry which now finds itself subject to numerous environmental changes as a consequence of the global climate crisis; all whilst being an entity by which people have and do live out domestic lives.

How can we engage with such co-existing histories and realities in order to adapt and transform when our cherished memories and places are at risk? As the North Sea increasingly becomes a place for research, natural energy, and conversations around climate change, what do we truly mean by gaining resilience?

In Therapy with North Sea* delves into these pressing questions through witty and participatory multimedia installations. It speculates on our future and seeks to prepare our collective imagination to dive forwards, and perhaps into, the North Sea.

* By referring to it without its noun-ness, Farhang encourages you to relate to the sea not as a distant object, but as a neighbour who we live alongside.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Solmaz Farhang is an artist and researcher based in London. She holds an MA in Art and Science from the University of Applied Arts Vienna and cofounded the art and design collective Transformation Agency for Agency (DTAFA). Farhang is also an Associate Lecturer at the University of the Arts London.

Farhang's work spans different disciplines including photography, video art, assemblage, drawing and multimedia installations. Central to her artistic practice is an exploration of storytelling and speculative thinking, through which she engages with themes of identity, ecology and the relationship between humans and nature.

Farhang's innovative approach leads her into unfamiliar environments, such as ecology and research labs, where she employs unconventional tools and materials along with found objects to create fresh, insightful perspectives. Through this lens, she leverages the concept of unknowing as an empowering force, transforming the absence of specific expertise into an opportunity for creative explorations and creation of new forms of knowledge. Oftentimes Farhang's works are participatory. In 'How to Become an Island – The Bootcamp', an exhibition presented in Graz (Austria) in 2024, six participatory multi-media installations and videos trained visitors to in how to become a suitable breeding ground for a tiny bird species, the Ringed Plover.

Solmaz Farhang has exhibited her work in venues such as Forum Stadtpark Graz (AT), Natural History Museum of Vienna (AT), National Museum of Bosnia and Herzegovina (BA), Ars Electronica, Linz (AT), Museum Quartier Vienna (AT), Kunsthalle Exnergasse (AT), Angewandte Interdiciplinary Lab (AT), Etiuda & Anima Festival (PL) and European Capital of Culture in Novi Sad Serbia (RS).

Breathing Station

To breathe with

Let's breathe with North Sea, with the water and the fish; with the plants and the gravel on the beach. Let's appreciate our intertwined lives, accept our desires and vulnerabilities; our need for air, for oxygen in our blood, our desire for safety and laughter, and for a place to belong. It is said that the oceans are the planet's lungs. Aren't they ours too? Take a seat here and imagine breathing with all the living things on the planet.

Listening Station

To listen to

Let's listen to North Sea, to the voices from the near and afar, from the past and the future, from within and around the sea; the sound of the church bells and the seagulls, the sailing boats and the fish, the whales and the lobsters, the whistles of the ships and the turbines. Near or far, we live with our head close to the North Sea*.

The sounds you listen to are two data files, one from a mooring called Stonehaven20 in the North Sea, at 20km distance from the coast and 108m of depth and one from Scalp Bank more than 60m from land and 55m deep. These recordings are filled with dolphin sounds, a vessel working nearby and the sound of waves.

Sound data has been provided by Marine Scotland Government.



Ben Adamson is a multimedia and sound artist specialising in multisensory installations that explore the intersections of performance, installation, and soundscape design. His work encourages audience participation, transforming them into active performers and listeners. Ben seeks to provoke and challenge perceptions, finding beauty in contrasting and harsh sounds to invite reflection on space, objects, and theme. Provocation is of the utmost importance throughout Ben's work with the intention of asking questions to the listener. Another area of his practice focuses on the intersection of playfulness and communication and involves probing the boundaries between performance, interaction and listening within his installation work. More

recently Ben's practice has engaged with co-creative process and community engaged projects focusing on mental health in local communities.

Talking to the Tide, 40 mins

Talking to the Tide is a participatory piece of performance of art – a collaboration between audience and performer. The audience are invited to become active creators, writers and artists in this piece by making their mark on Ben's skin. Anyone who wishes to share their sentiment or message with the audience may whisper it in Ben's ear and he will share it with everyone else. Periodically, the 'tide will go out' and some of the marks and messages will be washed away.

Share as wholeheartedly as you will – secrets, thoughts, feelings, fears – in the knowledge that all is impermanent and will be washed away eventually...


